FROM THE CHAIR

The End Of The Year—a time when the various media outlets like to provide us with a retrospective list of events good and bad—that occurred during the previous twelve months. I too have been reflecting on that theme relative to jazz. I decided not to focus on how many great performers left us during 2013, but rather to share some thoughts about current and future jazz activities here on the Peninsula and some new challenges for PAJA.

My musings lead me to remember an article by Richard Scheinin of the Bay Area News Group that appeared in the Daily News on November 30. His thesis was that "new venues, small clubs, are bringing new energy to the Bay Area live music scene." This is a welcome observation especially for those of us who have long been working to keep jazz sounds alive during a long period of declining appeal.

I would submit that a contributing factor to this revitalization has been the efforts of various non-profit operations right here in River City. Consider The Stanford Jazz Workshop with its always rich summer series of live concerts, with a plethora of established as well as emerging talent. Then we have a local thing called radio, namely KCSM, a singular voice for jazz 24/7; now, due to the Internet, it is reaching a worldwide audience. And don't forget San Jose Jazz, a non-profit that provides unique live listening opportunities all during the year, and particularly during the summer festival that offers a wide variety

of jazz genres, headliners and local performers. PAJA provides some financial support to these three entities, among others.

Did I mention that Ye Olde Palo Alto Jazz Alliance is chugging along into its 23rd year? We too strive to keep jazz alive with outstanding concerts, showcasing remarkable jazz artists. Our primary charge is to stimulate and support jazz education in a variety of ways. Certainly these efforts have helped build a wider audience, as well as provide older devotees opportunities to enjoy live gigs at easily accessible sites and without breaking the bank.

A case in point would be our finale of the 2013 season with a slam-bang effort at Woodside Priory in Portola Valley by the Joe LaBarbera Quintet, which came up from Los Angeles. Too bad that so many of you missed it. You would have heard a thrilling medley of West Side Story selections, arranged by Bill Cunliffe, the group's stellar pianist. He had just finished this suite the week before and our event gave it its first public exposure. Artistically, the show was very special, but attendance was a bit disappointing—and the cost of the event was not covered. But thanks to your dues and contributions, the show will go on, and we look forward to some great new concerts in 2014.

We of course would like to be able to *increase* our support of jazz education; that means finding more ways to keep moving forward, such as attracting new members, and offering popular concerts that do well financially. In addition, we need to stimulate more contributions without being annoying or boorish—contributions that will underwrite our concert expenses and enable us to assist the Stanford Jazz Workshop scholarship fund, among other causes. PAJA is an all-volunteer organization; there is no paid staff. Any ideas or suggestions on how we can best reach our goals are most welcome.

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DR. HERB WONG RECOGNIZED

JOHN PIZZARELLI ON IMPROVISATION

John's answer to what was his opinion about complete improv ("organic" and spontaneous, a la Lee Konitz) as opposed to "figured-out stuff": "Those 'figured-out' things started organically somewhere—at a rehearsal, strumming on the porch, being shown a chord by another guitarist. I think it's all great. I don't come out on one side or the other on this, but the total improv thing of, 'I'll play something weird, you follow same, and we all make up stuff for seven minutes' is questionable. Audiences are all for 100 per cent improv in theory—until they have to sit through it. I have never heard that work well. It's managing within a structure that makes improvisation so difficult." EIGSTI AND RHAPSODY IN BLUE AGAIN—DISCOUNT TICKETS

MONTEREY JAZZ—MERRY CHRISTMAS

The Monterey Jazz Festival found a tasty sugarplum in its Christmas stocking this year, a \$37,500 Art Works grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support the 57th Annual Monterey festival in 2014. Festival development director Andrew Sudol said that the NEA support "allows for the participation of NEA Jazz Masters, and other incredible jazz artists who perform, adjudicate, educate and mentor young musicians in our jazz education programs and at the Festival itself." MJF plans to spend more than \$600,000 on jazz education in 2014.

RANDY BRECKER REMINISCES

"I had one solo a night with Blood, Sweat & Tears. As much as I liked playing with the band, it wasn't quite right for me. I didn't get enough room to stretch out. So when Horace [Silver] called and asked me to join his band, I kind of jumped at the chance. The very next Blood, Sweat & Tears record came out—one that I would have been a part ofsold eleven million copies, and they had agreed to split everything equally. So, I kind of lost out a little on that one—since Horace's gig paid \$250 a week. He took out taxes, which left \$147 a week, and out of that I had to pay for my hotel. We would find hotels for \$15 a week, believe it or not. We would stay in San Francisco at a place called the Swiss American Hotel, \$15 a week. It was famous because Lenny Bruce used to stay there. It was up the street from the Jazz Workshop, where we used to play. It was a virtual flophouse, basically, full of stoned-out hippies. That's how we were living in those days. Meanwhile, Blood, Sweat & Tears had gone on and they were making like \$100,000 a gig." From an interview with Randy in Eric Nemeyer's Jazz Insider.


