### **GLENN GRIGG WEIGHS IN**

In the last issue of the *Buff* we polled a few members to get their input on their favorite jazz musicians and/or groups. Glenn Grigg's contribution came in late, but was so interesting, we thought we'd print it anyway. "Sonny Rollins: Sonny plays with strength, clarity of tone and has a vast repertoire. His 'voice' is unique, unmistakable and most assuredly his own. It only takes me about three 'toots' on his tenor and I'm sayin', 'Yeah, that's my man Sonny.' His improvisations are often long and winding, but never boring or repetitious as, it seems to me, there are always subtle references to the melody of the song that launched it. When he gets into circular breathing, he just goes on and on, in a marvelous way! I love seeing him, as I have each time he has played the Monterey Jazz Festival. When I hear him play, I can visualize him standing tall, playing to each and every one of us.

"Now I'm not taking anything away from **Charles Lloyd.** He has his own unique style and tone. I was at MJF when he premiered 'Forest Flower Sunrise, Forest Flower Sunset.' It was a night to remember. Truly one of the all-time highlights of any MJF that I've attended. (And I've attended all of them, but two!) And like Sonny, he too is easy to recognize after just a few notes. Then, there are the young lions, like **Joshua Redman.** A master of the tenor in his own right. He's a youngster because I remember seeing him and Roy Hargrove (trumpet) at Monterey when they were both in a high school band together.

"Speaking of young lions, one cannot overlook tenor men Craig Handy or Ravi Coltrane either. OK, this counts as one of the five [you asked for]. Sonny is the one and everyone else is honorable mention, so to speak. I have other instruments, including vocalists, to explore [for the four other favorites]." OK, Glenn we'll stay tuned. Let us have your other selections when the muse strikes you.

# INFLUENCING VIBRAPHONIST JOE LOCKE

"His older siblings brought home records by Led Zeppelin, Jimi Hendrix and Queen, while his father routinely came home from a day of teaching to unwind with Beethoven or Mahler. 'At night sometimes he used to like to play Gregorian chants,' Locke recalls. 'I remember waking up in the middle of the night and hearing monks singing downstairs. It was a beauti-



ful way to grow up'... By age 13 he was playing drums in a rock band when his mother suggested that he play glockenspiel in the high school marching band. 'I won't even delve into the psychology behind that,' he laughs, looking back on what at the time seemed—and still seems—like a very unhip choice of instrument... A newspaper ad for a used vibraphone caught his mother's eye one morning, and thinking the vibes were something like a glockenspiel, she took her son to have a look. 'A set of vibes costs thousands of dollars, but here was a Jenco vibraphone for something like \$250. I used it for my first professional jobs. If there had been an ad in the paper for a glockenspiel that day, I would probably be a jazz glockenspiel player today.'" From "Good Vibes," by Shaun Brady, in *Jazziz* magazine, Fall 2015.
