Since Herb's passing, a group of former attendees of those courses, now known as Herb's Herd and ably led by Tom Meeks, continue to meet on a Tuesday, just as they did when Herb was alive—only now it's at someone's home and only once a month. The focus of each get-together has varied from viewing jazz video documentaries to live performances. All of us enjoy keeping the social relationship alive as well as sharing jazz time together.

One jazz fan who has hosted Herb's Herd is Teresa Anthony. She is a jazz singer, known professionally as Teresa Bleux, and she has just joined PAJA's Board of Directors. THE MONTCLAIR BIG BAND TEARS IT UP



PAJA's winter concert (January 9) featured the dynamic Montclair Women's Big Band and there was an excellent turn-out for the band at Menlo-Atherton High School's beautiful Center for the Performing Arts. The 16-piece orchestra is led by trumpeter Ellen Seeling and saxophonist Jean Fineberg, and its personnel list includes such well known Bay Area performers as bassist Ruth Davies and sax veteran Mad Duran. The band treated us to superb renditions of such swing/jazz classics as "In The Mood," "Caravan," and a high-energy closing version of "Sing Sing Sing". Other high-lights were Joe Henderson's "Recordame" and Stanley Turrentine's "Sugar." Bay Area favorite Kenny Washington joined the band for a vocal tribute to Frank Sinatra and Billie Holiday, offering two songs associated with Billie: "Good Morning, Heartache," and "God Bless the Child." It was all a triumphant evening, arranged and spearheaded by PAJA event chair Harvey Mittler. Harvey is now in the planning stage for a spring concert, probably in early May. Stay tuned.

"Working with Dave [Brubeck] was such a positive experience. Sometimes, I would be playing a solo, and people would be looking at me not knowing what to think because I'm not Paul Desmond and don't sound like Paul Desmond—even though he is one of my idols. But Dave would be looking at me and smiling, and they'd be looking at him and thinking, 'This guy must play OK because Dave likes him.' That's a great lesson to learn because sometimes you're on the bandstand with somebody who looks morose, like they're not having a good time. Dave put positive energy out there every moment." NEWPORT NEWS

The 16th annual Newport Beach Jazz Party was held at the Fashion Island Marriott Hotel, February 11-14. Ten enthusiasts from PAJA were in attendance (you can see several of us in Karl Robinson's photo on page 3). This was my second year and the musicians were, as expected, extremely talented, and of high caliber and superb quality. There were six pianists, an organist, six guitar virtuosos, a vibes player, six bassists, six drummers, two trumpeters, two trombones, seven reed players, nine (!) vocalists, and four big bands. If names like Tamir Hendelman, Russell Malone, John Clayton, Scott Hamilton, Kenny Washington, and the Clayton-Hamilton Jazz Orchestra don't pique your interest, you can't call yourself a jazz fan.

The theme was "For the Love of Jazz and the Great American Songbook" and therefore 90% familiarity with the tunes played. The musicians played with enthusiasm and great rapport with their other musical mates. The following comments came from a "Tales From The Road" panel discussion, with many upbeat, encouraging and comical contributions:

"When you play, you make yourself happy, regardless of the critics, writers and the audience. Jazz musicians are always learning and the younger audience is still coming," Ken Peplowski.

"Jazz education programs are more prolific than ever before," Jeff Hamilton (certainly encouraging for us and PAJA's mission).

In an answer to "where is jazz headed?" Houston Person responded, "Jazz is here! It is not going anywhere and we as musicians have to relate to our audience, whether it's blues, dance music, or jazz. That is our responsibility."
