Jazz Cruise Reminiscences

Sometime in the 1980s, I saw the pianist Eddie Higgins at a San Jose club, Garden City—remember that jazz spot? Eddie talked about participating in a jazz cruise with his wife (the vocalist Meredith D'Ambrosio) and that was the first time I was aware that such a combination of sea voyage and music was available. But I put that on the back burner until the late 90's when I took a Greek Island cruise with my family which demonstrated to me how enjoyable these trips at sea can be.

So, the jazz cruise bug got serious after that and after doing some research I found The Jazz Cruise, a St. Louis-based outfit that had operated cruises, with a jazz theme, since 2001. My wife and I signed up, I think, for the 2005 cruise, two other couples joined us, and we enjoyed it immensely. Taylor Eigsti was on that cruise, as were a number of artists we'd later see almost every year on the cruise, like



Ken Peplowski, Wycliffe Gordon, Shelly Berg, and Ann Hampton Callaway. Each year, there are more than 100 jazz musicians on board. That year the cruise featured Frank Capp's Juggernaut big band, with some great Neil Hefti arrangements. Wow!

I bought the CD from Frank Capp and still play it often.

There's plenty of opportunity to exchange words with some of your favorites, and I was able to do that with the likes of Jimmy Heath, Anat Cohen, Rickey Woodard, Jeff Hamilton, Cyrille Aimee, and many more over the years. They don't remember me, but I certainly remember them. I always seemed to embarrass myself by asking dumb questions and getting blank stares in return. I determined to fix this when I buttonholed John Pizzarelli one year and asked how the Boston Red Sox would do that year (I knew that was his favorite team, and since I'm originally from Massachusetts, I knew something about the Bosox). He was happy to talk about

baseball for about 15 minutes.

Of all the musicians on the ship, Ann Hampton Callaway was always the most fan-friendly. You might be walking down a hallway and Ann might then initiate a conversation with you. She's a great wisecracker (she calls herself the illegitimate daughter of Lionel Hampton and Cab Calloway) and it's no wonder her fans are so devoted.

Every year Shelly Berg gives a one-hour course in jazz, and these are well attended. I usually got lost 10 minutes in, but Shelly always made it enjoyable enough so that it's still an hour well spent.

Panel discussions with the musicians are always worth listening to. One time Jeff Clayton asked the audience what would they rather hear—familiar tunes or originals? Someone in the audience shouted out, "Both!" Right answer.

I heard Taylor Eigsti once say at one of these panels that as a young pianist he wanted to play faster, so he went to Benny Green for a lesson. I was always curious as to what Green told him, and when Benny was here for a PAJA concert in 2017, I had the chance to ask him what his lesson with Taylor involved. Benny explained that it was a matter of practice. Start slow, and increase the speed gradually, until you get to the desired pace. But what is important is playing each note—not gliding over a passage. Each note must be heard regardless of how fast it gets. Listen to Taylor playing "Got a Match" on his "Resonance" album (2003) and it's obvious he learned the lesson well.

These are some of my highlights in 13 years of Jazz Cruising:

- * Ann Hampton Callaway singing "Over the Rainbow." (2007)
- * Vocalist Cyrille Aimee, with two Hot Club guitarists from France. (2015?)
- * Byron Stripling's tribute to Louis Armstrong (2015)
- * John Pizzarelli/Bruce Forman guitar summit (2008?) Laughs and great picking. Oh, my.
- * Impromptu duet with Emmet Cohen and Joey DeFrancesco. Emmet on organ, Joey D on piano. (2016?)
