
SUMMER JAZZ ON THE PENINSULA

LOOKING BACK By Ed Fox

If you held my feet to the fire and made me pick my all-time favorite jazz album, I guess I'd have to nominate Brubeck's Jazz at Oberlin, so that tells you that I am a fairly conservative fan. You might say: "Wait a minute, pal, that's not even Brubeck's best album—what about Time Out, which contains "Blue Rondo A La Turk" and "Take Five," the best selling single in jazz history? And it has Joe Morello on the drums, which took the quartet to a new level?" I'd reply that you are right; that was a great album, but Oberlin has five tunes recorded with the immediacy and excitement of a live audience.

And it has my favorite tune, *The Way You Look Tonight*, a brilliant combination of intricate arrangement and improvisation that to me, and perhaps thousands of other fans, makes for a very satisfying work of art. The classically trained Brubeck takes that beautiful melody and he and the wonderful Paul Desmond turn it around every which way. That concert took place 72 years ago and it still seems fresh and exciting three quarters of a century later.

I am a sucker for "The Way You Look Tonight." Tony Bennet's slow tempo version raises emotions in me I didn't know I had. "The Way You Look Tonight" is a Great American Songbook staple, composed by Jerome Kern, with lyrics by Dorothy Fields. Fred Astaire sang it in the movie "Swingtime" and it won the 1936 Oscar for original song. Of course in the Brubeck version you don't hear much of the melody, but that's OK. It all works for me.

ALL IN THE FAMILY

If there is such a thing as First Family of Jazz on the Peninsula, then I am nominating Dave Miller and family. Dave sits on PAJA's Board of Directors, but he's also of course a marvelous jazz pianist. He and his vocalist daughter Rebecca Du-Maine know their way around the Great American Songbook and they've produced several wonderful albums together. We are very happy they'll be performing at our member party on May 11 at the Palo Alto Art Center Courtyard. I'm also very anxious to hear a jazz ensemble Dave has recruited from UC Santa Cruz. That group's pianist is Dave's grandson (Rebecca's son), Jackson Bryman. They should shake the trees a bit in the Courtyard. Jackson's sister Kealy may favor us with a tune or two—perhaps in a duet with Mom? Hope to see you all there for all the fun.
